Emphasizes the application of problem identification and management, health promotion, and client and family counseling. Clinical and supervised lab experiences focus on foundations of nurse practitioner practice, initial role identification and opportunity to apply classroom and core content.

- 8. Analyze the major health problems affecting women, children and adolescents.
- 9. Initiate the appropriate health promotion and maintenance strategies for primary, secondary, and tertiary prevention of common acute and chronic illnesses of women, children and adolescents.
- 10. Examine the role of the family nurse practitioner providing primary health care to women, children and adolescents in nontraditional settings.
- 11. Analyze ethical, legal, economic, political, social, technological, and environmental issues from a global perspective to influence health care of women, children and adolescents.
- 12. Apply appropriate research findings in delivery of primary health care with women, children and adolescents.
- 13. Participate in health education and management of women, children and adolescents and their families.
- 14. Apply health status, risk reduction, and service and protection objectives targeting maternal and infant health to clinical practice.
- 15. Practice in the role of the nurse practitioner as a member of the health care team.
- 16. Collaborate with other members of the health care team when appropriate.

• **A student must pass both the didactic and clinical components of the course. Failure of either the didactic or clinical component will result in an "F" for the course. If the student fails the course and is deemed eligible by the School of Graduate Studies and the College of Nursing & Health to repeat the course both components must be repeated. Passing the didactic includes passing at least a 70% for the Women's Health content as well as a 70% for the Pediatric content. 7801 is not split so a failure in either content portion will require repeating the entire course.

 or another student will not be accepted for credit in this course; this includes previously submitted
 assignments for students who are repeating this course. Material downloaded from the Internet must
 be properly cited, referenced in the reference list, and must come from a reputable web site. Wikipedia
 is NOT a reputable source for your academic work.
 - Papers and assignments are due on the date identified in the appropriate PILOT drop box. The
 faculty is under no obligation to accept late assignments. In extenuating circumstances, students
 may negotiate with the course instructor for a later due date for assignments. However, this
 must be done BEFORE the scheduled due date AND a deduction of 5% will occur from the
 student's assignment grade for each late day (including weekends).
- **Time Commitment:** To be successful in completing the didactic requirements of this course, students are expected to spend at least 3-4 hours a week for each course credit hour in reading (chapters in the text as well as supplemental article posted in the *Pilot* Modules) and studying for this course in addition to listening to recorded lectures and taking exams (this is counted in your course credit time).

DIDACTIC COURSE ASSIGNMENTS: Lecture



Integration of didactic learning into clinical thinking and decision-making is a critical component of a FNP student's education. It is important for both the instructor and the student to be able to objectively evaluate the progression of this integration. Read all assigned readings <u>BEFORE</u> listening to lectures. All lectures will be pre-recorded & available on Tegrity (widget can be found on the course home page); supplemental readings & power points for lectures may be found in the Content section in the appropriate modules.

Quizzes

6 quizzes (3 covering Women's Health content and 3 covering Pediatric content) will be posted throughout the term on the *Pilot* course page for students to take. To facilitate mastery of class content and in preparation for the final exam, the format for the quizzes will be multiple choice questions covering course and clinical content. The quizzes will be multiple choice and WILL BE AVAILABLE for a three day period (See *Course Calendar* for dates), however we strongly recommend you take them during times that the CATs HELP desk is available. Quizzes will be OPEN-BOOK. However each student will need to be familiar with the material in a sufficient manner that will facilitate completion of the exam in the required amount of time (e.g., answer 25 multiple choice questions in 25 minutes); there really is no time to look things up as you go along. Students will be required to use *Respondus Lockdown Browser* to take any online testing. It is expected that there WILL NOT be sharing of exam information or answers between students and that students will not copy or print exam questions or answer sets. (*All students are expected to follow the* Academic Honesty & Guidelines *set out in the* Graduate Student Handbook *for the CoNH and University* Academic Integrity Policies.)

• **Quiz Review** - If a student receives a Grade of C or lower on any quiz they are encouraged to contact the course instructor(s) to set up a 1:1 session to discuss their performance. Students are always encouraged to ask questions about course material throughout the term. There will be no review of the final exam.

Case Presentations-SOAP Rubric

Integration of didactic learning into clinical thinking and decision-making is a critical component of a FNP student's education. It is important for both the instructor and the student to be able to objectively evaluate the progression of this integration. Each student will be responsible to write two original case studies (1 Women's Health topic and 1 Pediatric topic) written in SOAP format (using only patient initials - no names or identifying information contained). The case chosen should be an actual case that you have come across in your clinicals from which you learned something. Students are to submit each case study to the appropriate *Pilot* drop box. The case studies must be original, stemming from what you have observed in practice.

• Grading for the assignment will be based on the *quality*, not simply the quantity. The assignment grading rubric will be available in the *Pilot* DROPBOX.

Comprehensive Written Final Exam

The written Final Exam will focus on didactic content with clinical application. The final exam will be comprehensive **CLOSED-BOOK** and will include all lecture and reading materials covered in the course. The written final exam will be computer-based and in a format similar to the quizzes. The final exam will be will be taken on the WSU campus during finals week.

Clinical Final Exams: Standardized Patients

A grade of at least 70% is required to pass each of the clinical final exams which are demonstrations of ability to assess diagnosis and provide health promotion education to one women's health client and one pediatric client. Standardized models will role-play a medical/surgical condition. Students are expected to gather a health history, perform an appropriate assessment, write a SOAP note, explain the rationale for the differential diagnosis, and management of the client, including needed patient education. See detailed grading criteria on *Pilot* course web site. There is no make-up opportunity for this evaluation. This is an individual effort and students will not be allowed to discuss the cases with other students during exam time.

CLINICALS:

(Please see NUR 7801 Clinical Expectations on Pilot for detailed explanations.)



Students MAY NOT BEGIN a clinical practice experience until they have received CLINICAL CLEARANCE via Immunitrax. Students are NOT be allowed to begin a clinical nursing course unless all requested information is up-to-date and on file in Immunitrax. There are NO exceptions. If a student is found to be participating in clinical experiences without up-to-date CLINICAL CLEARANCE, they will receive a failing grade in the clinical which means they will not successfully complete the course.

To successfully pass clinical you must do the following:

- 1) complete *Clinical Journals* daily documenting clinical experiences that illustrate clinical decision-making and professionalism
- 2) document patient data & clinical hours in the Clinical Log every day of clinical
- 3) receive a satisfactory evaluation from your preceptor
- 4) receive a satisfactory evaluation from your clinical instructor
- 5) turn in completed Clinical Hours Verification form

Journals and Clinical Logs

Clinical learning is paramount to the role of the advanced practice nurse. Professionalism, creativity and demonstration of expert clinical skills are expected behaviors. In addition, the student is expected to demonstrate the advanced practice role through clinical practice that includes good communication, advanced knowledge, research utilization, cultural considerations, and ethical and legal considerations.

Keeping an accurate **daily** Journal and Clinical Log is an account of your learning during the quarter. **BOTH** are to be submitted into the appropriate drop box in *Pilot* **each week** using the provided template (other formats will not be accepted). Documentation in **both** the Journal and Clinical Log portions is required for each clinical experience. All Clinical Logs and Journals must be submitted to pass the clinical requirement. These documents allow the instructor to partially evaluate the student's progression in the clinical setting.

- **Journal** –Your clinical journal is an account of your learning experience in the clinical setting during the semester. It includes subjective documentation of clinical experiences that illustrate clinical decision-making and professionalism.
- Clinical Log Clinical Log shows an objective account of hours and progress. In the daily clinical log students are required to record the gender, age, diagnosis, brief tx plan, and student's role (observation, consultation w/preceptor and/or other colleagues) for each patient interacted with during the clinical experience. The student should keep the original clinical log for his/her permanent personal records. This will allow the student to compile an accurate overview of the types, ages, and clinical skills performed during their clinical rotations (extremely useful for job hunting!).

Students are required to complete 168 clinical hours (about ½ for peds & ½ for women's health). In addition to tracking hours in the clinical log, the student must also document hours on the *Clinical Hours Verification* form which must be signed by the preceptor weekly. Misrepresentation of clinical hours or falsification of patient encounters will result in automatic failure of this class and review by the Office of Community Standards & Student Conduct for determination of continuation in the College of Nursing and Health.

On-Going Clinical Instructor Evaluation

The clinical instructor will either evaluate the student and preceptor at the clinical site at least once during the semester to evaluate student progression. More clinical site visits will occur as necessary per the discretion of the student, preceptor, and/or clinical instructor.

Clinical Instructor & Preceptor Final Evaluations

Each student will receive a final written summative evaluation of the student's clinical performance and experience from their clinical instructor at the end of the semester. Students will also receive a written evaluation of their clinical performance from their preceptor. Students will be asked to complete an evaluation of themselves, the clinical site, and the preceptor.

Clinical Hours Verification Form & Clinical Evaluation Forms

Keep the *Clinical Hours Verification* form at your clinical site(s), and have your preceptor sign weekly. **Page 2 of this form must be typed** – Please complete this portion of the form that summarizes hours at the end of your clinical. Once you complete your hours, make of copy of both portions of this form for your records, and turn in the original to the course coordinator. **You must bring this completed form with you to the Final Exam on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>July 29</u>, <u>2014</u>.**

*Each student is required to turn in the following completed forms to the Course Coordinator at the Final Exam on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>July 29</u>, <u>2014</u>. We strongly recommend you keep a completed copy of each form for your records.
